### Witheridge Parish Council Summer 2024 Report

At the June council meeting Andy Cattermole from Allison Homes, builders of the new houses at Juniper Way, attended to give an update on the development progress and to answer Councillor questions. The site is now owned by Legal and General and the build process is now scheduled for two and a half years rather than the original five, and the first tranche of houses are to be completed and available by September 2024. Legal and General are currently preparing a full advertising campaign, however, should anyone be seeking housing you must register with Devon Home Choice. There will also be a site notice board erected for updates between phase one and phase two developments. A community fund for local projects has been established. Mr Cattermole will aim to attend parish council meetings periodically, to keep us updated. Work has begun on improving the footpath to connect pedestrians along Fore Street to the village centre and when completed work can begin on restoring the Northern open space to a level grass area. Once finished the transfer of the land to the Parish council will be expedited.

Two Parish Councillors Cunningham and Bibby are liaising with the developer to open the possibility of them undertaking some works to restore the BMX track at the adventure Playground and Allison Homes are undertaking a survey at no cost to the council.

There has been some vandalism at the adventure playground with graffiti on the skate ramps and the destruction of a litter bin. Graffiti has also appeared on the youth shelter at the Parish hall. Many thanks to councillors Northam and Cunningham for removing the offending drawings and the council will replace the bin.

Both Councillors and residents of Willow Rise are concerned with the surfacing and condition of the path through the adventure playground as the top surface is spreading on to the safer surfacing of the play equipment and also has travelled into the centre of the roundabout. Myself, the clerk and Cllr Northam met with Kompan, the playground installers, on 30/05/24 to discuss the problem and to seek an

alternative. Kompan's tender specification replaced tarmac with "self- binding gravel which has proven with the shedding onto the safer surfacing that it is far from self -binding". We were informed at the meeting that the top surface was 20/30mm gravel and would need maintenance weekly to sweep back onto the path. At no point were any caveats given as to required path maintenance and if so would not have accepted the suggested surface. The tender specification 9.2 "All proprietary play equipment and surfacing shall comply fully with BSEN 1176, BSEN 1177 and any other relevant play industry safety standards "The stone spreading onto the safer surfacing where children can fall is not compliant with the tender specification above." It was agreed at council that the clerk would write to Kompan stating the works were subject of a JCT Design and Build Contract therefore under the contractual obligations what action were Kompan proposing. At our July meeting no reply had been received and was it decided to write again asking for an answer within seven days. The roundabout will be repaired under warranty.

Residents of Lakelands are justifiably worried about the overgrown horse chestnut trees at the entrance to the close. This time last year a huge limb crashed down onto the road and blocked the entrance. The Parish council wrote to the county council, whose land it is, asking for a tree survey to be carried out and any remedial action taken. Their reply to our concerns was "We would only commission tree surgery to dangerous or diseased trees and as they are neither we will be taking no action to your request." At our June meeting, following the DCC response dated 12/04/24 it was decided that the clerk writes to county councillor Jeremy Yabsley seeking action to address the problem of the overgrown trees.

Looking out at the weather as I write this it is raining again. I hope we all get some sunny warm weather soon and enjoy the children's holidays.

**Planning** applications received after agenda publication will be dealt with owing to a 21 day limit on the council responding to consultations from the Planning Authority. The parish council is only a consultee, and does not determine applications.

Residents can make representations in writing to the clerk or in person during the public session held at the start of a meeting. Please note in accordance with Council Standing Order 3(h) a question shall not give rise to a debate or require an immediate response

## Witheridge Gardening Club

In May, we had a talk from Nikki Rule-Jackson of The Littlest Wildlife Hotel who, together with her mother Valerie Jackson, gave us a very informative and entertaining evening on what they do and which animals they care for.

They look after British Native Wildlife only, not invasive species which they are not allowed to release into the wild. They do not provide a veterinary service, but work in conjunction with local vets if an animal needs medical care/treatment.

They are based just outside Alswear, having moved from Cornwall in 2022. They rely on donations and have recently applied for Charitable status which, if agreed, would enable them to apply for grants. Apart from money, acceptable donations are newspapers, wet cat food, dried cat/kitten food, Royal Canin Babydog formula and Royal Canin Babydog mousse.

Animals they will accept for care and rehabilitation are: Hedgehogs, stoats, weasels, polecats, voles, rabbits, hares, fox cubs, badger cubs, chicks and owls.

Last year, they cared for over 400 animals and birds, including Hazel Dormice and buzzards and lots of hedgehogs – adults as well as babies. Contrary to popular belief, hedgehogs do not eat slugs, which will give them lungworm.

Netting is very harmful to hedgehogs and also to owls. It is recommended that the netting is raised about 30cm off the ground to prevent animals getting trapped. If you find a hedgehog, or any animal, trapped in netting and are able to cut the netting away without harming the animal, then please take it to a vet who will be able to remove any netting which may have become embedded in the animal's skin.

If you find an animal which needs rescuing, then contact the Littlest Wildlife Hotel for help and advice on 07481 801447.

We had a coach trip in June to Bicton Park Botanical Gardens in Budleigh Salterton, and had a super day out. The weather was glorious, the gardens looked fantastic and the food wasn't bad either!

Quite a few people enjoyed a train ride round the gardens, seeing them from different viewpoints.

At our regular meeting in June, we had a very informative and enjoyable talk from Nigel Wright, a Bonsai Artist. He brought with him a selection of Bonsai trees and explained how he had got them to their respective shapes. (He has about 120 Bonsai specimen at home).



The art of Bonsai started about 4,000 years ago in China and was then taken over by the Japanese. Bonsai trees are normal trees that have been pruned, trimmed and wired to keep their miniature shapes, and in the main are kept outside – just like their full-size counterparts. They require watering and feeding daily – they are only in shallow pots – and trimmed regularly to keep their shape.

Trees popular for training as Bonsai are Acer, Larch, Juniper, Scots Pine.

### Allotment Society — Winter

Well June and July have come and gone, where did those months go! We've all been busy sowing and planting out crops and trying to keep on top of the weeding, watering and tying in. The best bit of course is the harvesting! Starting with potatoes – new potatoes have that amazing taste and have harvested well despite the wet spring. We also have lovely broccoli with the excess being frozen.

It's never too late to sow some vegetables.

**August** - Swiss Chard, winter-hardy spring onions, radishes are very easy to grow and reliable, make direct sowings for harvesting in the Autumn. You can still make direct sowing of carrots, but choose a fast maturing variety such as Adelaide.

**September** - is the best time to start sowing the vegetables that can provide you with winter harvest and early pickings in spring and summer. You can sow spring cabbages and spinach, winter salads, broad beans and peas for earlier harvests next spring, onions, shallots and garlic, and quick-growing crops such as turnips and radish.

As we don't have a water supply on site we rely on a delivery from the heavens above. We make full use of the shed to save as much water as possible and several allotmenteers have found ways of catching water on their allotments. Your plants need less water than you think. Watering little and often does not help, as the water does not penetrate deep into the ground and encourages plants to develop roots near the soil's surface. One good soak every 10 days is better than a daily sprinkle. Water in the early morning or late evening, this gives the water a chance to penetrate the soil rather than evaporating. It may take a little longer but watering around the plants gets the water to where it is needed. Spraying the whole plot or using sprinklers simply waters the weeds and the water doesn't soak into the soil. Soaker hoses and sprinklers should never be needed on an allotment plot.

Remember we reap what we sow.

# Update from Cllr Peter Jones Your Independent District Councillor

Hi everyone,

I do hope you are all enjoying this wonderful summer weather! Since I last updated you, it has been rather busy. The constant flow of meetings continues and I have been busy with case work in the community including rat infestations, fly-tipping and much more. Here are some key updates.

### St John's Fayre

It was a privilege to be part of the St John's Fayre Committee to see the return of what is such a vital community event alongside such a committed and fun team. It was a wonderful day with so many out enjoying the parade, festivities at the village hall, and a fantastic evening party. A big well done and thank you to the many people who made it happen and ensured it was such a success.

### **Willow Heights Development**

Following the last update many of you attended a public meeting with Allison Homes, Legal and General Affordable Homes and the council planning team to discuss the change to the Willow Heights development to include 100% affordable homes. It was a heated meeting and the community expressed their concerns and asked probing questions. Concerns centred around the impact on the community and existing infrastructure.

In April the deal was signed and the site is now owned by L&G with Allison's homes responsible for delivering the build.

Whilst we couldn't change the overall proposal some concessions were negotiated. The full 106 contribution was paid in full to the district and county council on the signing of the contract. This means that the community can access a substantial pot of money for community facilities many years earlier than originally agreed. Alison Homes has also agreed to an additional £15k for local projects. Applications for this will be opened soon, along with Allison Homes I will assist in ensuring that this is allocated to local groups and projects.

### Peter Jones—District Councillor Update. (continued)

Allison Homes is also offering time and resources for local projects including a new disabled ramp at the Rest-a-while, and a full refurbishment of the pump track amongst other projects.

An important concession is that the affordable and social rent properties must prioritise those with a local connection before the area widens to surrounding parishes and districts. This means that many who would not meet the criteria will be eligible for these homes. If you need local affordable or social housing please make sure you register and include all necessary details on the Devon Homes Choice website.

#### 106 open space money

When I last updated you I hoped that we could undertake a community led approach to the allocation of these vital funds. Frustratingly it is clear that the projects are already defined in the planning agreement and although tweaks may be possible the projects are now defined. I am working closely with the named groups to ensure there is the greatest impact on the community.

The parish hall group are looking to apply to update this important facility to secure its condition for the future.

The sports field committee are working alongside the football club and the school with the intention of further engagement with other parts of the community for an application for new facilities which will provide a consistent all year round surface for a multitude of activities including sport, fitness and recreation, the need for which has been identified over many occasions after inclement weather where the current setup means the ground becomes unusable.

The Tennis Club are looking to add lights.

There is money available for allotment space, however, it is possible to use this for a similar community project. A community orchard is being considered. Woody Fox is working on a project, if you are interested in helping to take this forward do contact Woody.

The Parish Council are also looking to explore the purchase of amenity land for the community.

### Water Quality

Along with a merry band of citizen scientists, we are regularly testing water quality in the Little Dart. It's a great opportunity to wander down to the stream with the children and take a break. We have recently reported potential pollution to the Environment Agency and South West Water. One incident was expected ,agricultural run, the other was an indication of pollution at Rackenford Sewage Works. We have been assured that there are no ongoing issues at the sewage works, but we will continue to monitor. We need more testers at sewage works and generally across the catchment. If you are testing or would like to test please do reach out to me or contact West Country Rivers Trust at csi@wrt.org.uk

At district level, I continue to lead the sub-committee on the subject. We have been holding further meetings with South West Water and our planning teams as we look to ensure that the future local plan includes policy to protect the rivers and beaches which make our district so special.

### **Agricultural Policy Meeting**

In June I took part in a public policy meeting where we quizzed experts from the farming community on the future of farming in North Devon and the changes to agricultural subsidies. It's clear that many are confused by the changes and that many may end up with reduced funding if they do not maximise the opportunities of the new scheme. Despite the short-term concern, the panel was optimistic for the future. Everyone in the sector must be getting advice from an agent to understand the new changes.

North Devon Council has recently launched grants for rural businesses through North Devon Plus. Do take a look at the scheme to see if you have an eligible project

### North Devon Council's Flourishing Culture Grant

A new grant is available that will give local groups, organisations and businesses funds to organise pop-up events, performances, projects and activities. It would be great if we can make use of this, more details are on my website.

### **Bus Service**

Despite coverage of the issue on Spotlight and the local newspapers, the poor service continues. Breakdowns and missed services are causing chaos and upset for those who rely on the buses.

Emily's petition has received over 300 signatures. If you haven't signed it please do. There is a link to it on my Facebook page. We are also compiling a list of all issues on a pinned post on the What's on in Witheridge FaceBook page. I will be compiling all of the recent Incidents and along with the petition it will be presented by our County Councillor Jeremy Yabsley to the cabinet on the 11th of July. We hope to push for the reinstatement of the direct service between Exeter and Barnstaple and a replacement of the unreliable buses which regularly break down. Please do report issues to the FB post or contact me or Jeremy at Jeremy.Yabsley@devon.gov.uk.

### Waste and recycling

Following a period of few issues I am hearing of the odd missed collection. With the increase in waste as tourists visit North Devon we do see more issues during the summer period. The recycling centre is also about to go through a full rebuild with improved equipment and logistics. If you do have an issue please report it to the customer service team. If you have a regular issue let me know so I can raise it with the heads of service.

### WITHERIDGE ASTRONOMICAL SOCIETY

We are now approaching the end of the summer season. If you can, look for the constellations of Scorpius and Sagittarius. For us they never rise high but you are looking into the very heart of our galaxy. This area is packed with nebulae and star clusters, many easily visible in binoculars.

<u>August</u> - a month of fun and games but in the early hours Mars has a close encounter with Jupiter, the Moon hides Saturn (from 4.28 am to 5.21 am), passes closely to Neptune occulting some of the Pleiades, and finally we have a display of the Perseid meteors. Great to hold a meteor party on the night of the 12/13 August. With everyone looking in different directions shout 'Meteor' every time one is spotted. A person needs to record the shouts, using a red torch to preserve night sight, as a record of the sightings. Each meteor is a high speed pellet of dust from the comet Swift-Tuttle.

**September** - Saturn is closest to the Earth on the 8<sup>th</sup> September at mag. +0.6. Its rings will be difficult to see because they are nearly edge on to us. It will be worth looking to see if you can spot Comet C/2023 A3 (Tsuchinshan-ATLAS) in the morning sky on about the  $28^{th}$  September. We are also treated to Mercury in the morning horizon. On the  $18^{th}$  we will have a partial eclipse of the Moon at 3.34am.

**October** - The Andromeda Galaxy is best placed for observing this month and many can see the galaxy with the unaided eye. At 2.5 million light years away the galaxy contains some 400 billion stars. Light from this galaxy started its journey to us 2.5 million years ago. This quarter we have quite a variety of objects to seek out. Unfortunately, many of them occur in the early morning. Dilemma! Do you set an alarm clock or opt for a good night's sleep? It is your choice. Why not come to the Witheridge Astronomical Society's meetings on the third Thursday at 7.30pm in the Parish Hall Committee Room as we learn from each other and share observation experiences. Don't forget, we have equipment that may be borrowed to aid you explore the night sky. **Steven Smith** 

### Police and Crime Commissioner's Councillor Advocate.

I serve as a Parish Councillor on Witheridge Parish Council. In that capacity I was elected to serve as a <u>Police and Crime Commissioner's</u> <u>Councillor Advocate</u>.

My function is to form a relationship with our local policing team through the Local Sector Inspector. This allows better use of police officer's time. Living in the village I am better positioned to be informed about crime and policing here and to bring community views to the police.

As a Police Advocate I have an understanding of the Commissioner's policing priorities, as well as her role as the public's voice for victims of crime. This advocate scheme works through frequent communication and access to information on policing issues.

My main role is to ensure that consistent, accurate and honest information relating to crime, victim services and community safety is cascaded to the public. There is also the provision of information about accessing victim services and restorative justice, as well as what happens if a case doesn't go to court or if the perpetrator is under the age of 18. Details can be provided of how to make a complaint if a victim or witness is unhappy with the service they have been provided.

As a Police Advocate I am not in a position to discuss individual cases or to problem solve on specific issues. I am happy to discuss any issues that anyone may feel, especially concerning the community involving policing issues. I received a phone call explaining that the Rest a While had been chosen as one of the Charities to receive a cheque from the Beerfest, I was thrilled and delighted, even more so when I was invited to receive the cheque at the Cricket Club at Nomansland,



On arriving I was greeted by several of the committee and other guests, who all received a glass of sparkling bubbly. I was asked to explain the reasoning behind the Rest a While, and what the money would be used for, what we did and what were the benefits to our community. I starting by saying that the Rest a While is a small building with a big heart, a heart that cares and listens to everyone who enters. The presentation went well and photos were taken. Chris Clark presented me with the cheque and smiling happily I took it, it was only when I read the amount that I realised what a generous gift this was, I must admit it was through tearful eyes that I thanked them on behalf of our committee, our regulars and those yet to join us.
